How to Install Texture/Behavior Packs Onto Minecraft PE and Windows 10.

Introduction: How to Install Texture/Behavior Packs Onto Minecraft PE and Windows 10.

A decent number of people who want to use Behavior Packs and/or Texture Packs in Minecraft don't really know how to put them onto their device. This tutorial will show you how to put these packs onto Minecraft Pocket Edition and Windows 10 Edition.

Step 1: Locate Addons You Want.

There aren't many places yet to get addons, and some of them may have malware. for a more trustworthy website, try "mcpedl.com". It has a number of addons, maps, textures, mods, and more. When at the website, click on the three bars at the top right (Full bar is revealed on PC), and tap on Add-ons, under the Mods section. Here, you will see a list of different addons you can find and use. When you click on an addon, you can see all the information of it, and what is changed.

Step 2: Install Addons on IOS.

Addons and Resource Packs are installed exactly the same way as each other, so just follow these instructions, only replace the addons with resource packs. At the bottom of the page there should be green download links, saying (.MCPac) or (.MCWorld). MCPacks are the behavior and resource packs, and the MCWorld are maps. Most addons will have 2 downloads, one for the behavior pack, one for the resource pack. Both are required. When you tap on the link, it will either take you straight to the download, or sometimes will go through adfly first. You should end up at MediaFire. When you click the "Download" button, it will take you to a white page with a paper on it, saying the name of the behavior or resource pack. There should then be a blue link at the bottom saying: Open in "Minecraft PE". Tap on it, and it should open the Minecraft PE app. When it loads, a small bar should be at the top of the screen saying "Successfully Downloaded (Addon/Resource Name)" When you press play, and either create a new world, or press the pencil icon next to an existing world. When in said menu, scroll down on the left side, you should see a section named Resource Packs, and Behavior Packs. When you tap on one of the packs, a warning will appear, telling you that your world may become damaged from using them. Press ok, and tap on the pack again to add it to your world. Make sure to include the resource pack that goes with the behavior pack (If there is one), so your game looks right. You now should be good!

Step 3: Install Addons to PC.

Installing Addons to Windows 10 edition is similar to iOS, but a little more tedious. Start by downloading the .MCPack you want to your computer. when you have it downloaded, rename the addon from "addon.MCPack" to "addon.zip". You will also need WinRAR to extract the file. Once the file is extracted, go to the following file:

Windows(C:)/Users/NAME/AppData/Local/Packages/Microsoft.MinecraftUWP_8wekyb3d8bbwe/LocalState/games/com.mojang/ Once there, you should see a couple of files. Take the extracted behavior pack and put it in the "behavior_packs" folder, and the resource pack into the "resource_packs" folder. Now all that's left is to open Minecraft Win10 Edition, click the pencil icon next to a world, and select the packs to the world. There you go!

Step 4: Removing Addons.

Well, it's easy for PC. You just have to go to the file where the addon was installed, and delete the file. Simple as that. But with iOS, there is no official way to remove them. There may be other addons that allow you to delete them. You can disable addons by pressing the minus button, but they will still be in the list of addons.

The best Minecraft texture packs - how to find, download and install texture packs to change your world.

The best Minecraft texture packs can give your game a complete visual overhaul, providing a quick and easy way to pep things up if you're starting to feel your blocks are looking a little drab. Whether you want to apply a specific theme to your world, or just change how everything looks to

make your adventures more interesting, these upgrades can do the job. If you combine the best Minecraft texture packs with the best Minecraft skins we've covered separately, you can almost make a completely different game.

There are both official paid versions as well as fan made Minecraft texture packs available for Minecraft. We're going to help you find the best Minecraft texture packs, and cover the basics of how to install them so you can literally change your world in minutes.

How to install Minecraft texture packs.

If you haven't played Minecraft in a while, the rules appear to have changed with the Bedrock Editions of the game, where there is a built-in store with free and paid texture packs for you to use, instead of an open source texture pack folder. Some of the texture packs listed here are on the storefront, and if you like them you should consider supporting the creators by purchasing them.

If you're still using Minecraft Java, all you have to do is hit 'Mods and Texture Packs' and then 'Open texture pack folder' and drop the .ZIP file you downloaded in there. Once you boot up, it should be an option in the texture pack menu.

For Minecraft Windows 10 edition, it's not as simple to install a texture pack outside of the storefront, and you have to make sure your texture pack is compatible with this edition of the game before you install.

Once you've got a compatible zip, hit the Windows button and type in %appdata%, then click on Local, then Packages/Microsoft.MinecraftUWP/LocalState/games/com.mojang then finally 'resource_packs' is the folder you're looking for. Stick the compatible zip in there, then boot up Minecraft Windows 10, click on Global Resources in the settings and it should be at the top.

The best Minecraft texture packs.

Sphax PureBDCraft.

If you've watched any let's plays of the game or had a poke around in the custom texture community for Minecraft, you will no doubt have heard of PureBDCraft. As well as covering every texture in the game, Sphax's pack has an attractive comic book style that many prefer to Minecraft's original textures. It's been around since the early days of Minecraft, but the holistic nature of the pack, the pleasing comic-book style and the clean edges make this one easy to recommend. Pick it up at the BDCraft website.

LB Photo Realism Reload.

This is a continuation of the iconic texture pack LB Photo Realism that was very popular in the early days of Minecraft. This lovely texture swap makes trees look fluffy and grass realistic. It's a radical change from the original textures and is good if you want to ground your game in as much realism as possible without it looking completely absurd. Of course, this makes the game more demanding, but that's the price you pay for such an impressive overhaul. Pick it up on CurseForge.

Faithful.

Faithful bills itself as the "most popular texture pack in Minecraft" and the numbers are certainly quite compelling. Most of its appeal comes from how little it changes the game. Small refinements are made to smooth out textures and provide an experience that retains the original art direction of the game with a bit more sheen. Pick it up at CurseForge.

SapixCraft.

This texture pack relies on "making your world as clean as possible" and the result is something truly beautiful. Rippling water and flowing grass curate an entirely different atmosphere that brings the magic back to Minecraft, especially if you've been away for a while. Pick it up at the official SapixCraft website.

Modern HD.

The Modern HD texture pack is perfect if you're looking to create brutalist structures and prime real estate to turn the wilderness into a far more homely place. It really shines when you're trying to create a cityscape with friends or looking to create a modern abode, a safe haven from the wild country outside your front door. Pick it up on Planet Minecraft.

CoterieCraft.

Another texture pack that seeks to stay true to the original vision of Minecraft whilst refining and improving the textures is CoterieCraft, a much-loved visual overhaul that makes plants and building materials pop. Pick it up on Planet Minecraft.

Eternal Hearts.

This quirky texture pack is based on the Kingdom Hearts series, but the best part about it is that instead of focusing on nitty gritty item reskins, it works to curate an atmosphere that feels adjacent to the JRPG series without being too in your face. Take a look for yourself over on Planet Minecraft.

Jolicraft.

Jolicraft is by far the most charming texture pack in Minecraft, and has been around for a long time now. That doesn't mean it's got any less cute.

Little teeth sticking out of a wolves' mouth, menus turned into shreds of paper, the whole shebang is utterly delightful and perfect if you're looking for a lo-fi, chill jaunt into the wilderness. Pick it up on Planet Minecraft.

Conquest.

Conquest is a medieval-inspired texture pack which is part of a larger resource-pack for Minecraft that warps the game into the distant past. If you're looking to transport your world into a unique setting filled with candelabras, regal thrones and wooden trapdoors, this is the overhaul for you. Pick it up on the Conquest website.

Yes you read that right - Minecraft has texture packs.

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Minecraft is not the first game one thinks of when it comes to texture packs – but the game does indeed support ‘resource packs’ that can transform the entire look of the game.

The texture packs don't get rid of the blocky style the game is built around of course, but now the blocks can look like anything you want, whether it's the long-requested high-resolution look to a Zelda pack and even a homage to Microsoft Paint.

Below we have a list of the very best Minecraft texture packs available, as well as a guide on how to install them – the Nether's blocks never looked so beautiful.

You can our other best-of Minecraft lists, including the best skins, shaders, mods and seeds.

How to install Minecraft texture packs.

Sorry console gamers – most of the texture packs on this list are for the Java edition of Minecraft played through Microsoft Launcher, though a few are available on the Bedrock edition through the Minecraft Catalog.

For those running the classic Java edition, however, here's a step-by-step guide on how to install the many weird and wonderful texture packs. If you have problems loading a particular texture pack, you may need to use an older version of Minecraft – which can be done through Microsoft Launcher under the ‘Installations’ tab.

Download your desired texture pack (if it is a .zip file, don't extract it). Launch Minecraft and click ‘Options’ on the main menu. Click on the ‘Resource Packs’ section. Click the ‘Open Resource Packs’ folder. Drag the downloaded texture pack into the folder. The texture pack will now appear in-game – you can use them by dragging them to the right column.

If you continue having issues it may be because several of the packs require Optifine to work, so make sure you have the latest version.

Bear in mind that Minecraft technically groups texture packs under ‘Resource Packs’ as part of their new umbrella term covering all custom assets not limited to just textures – but for the purposes of this article the two are one and the same.

Faithful (32×32)

Faithful very much lives up to its name as at first there seems little difference to regular Minecraft. However, Faithful actually doubles the resolution of Minecraft's textures so that they're 32×32 – so while the style is exactly the same, every block looks sharper, every tree fuller and everything looks that little better. It's definitely the subtlest texture pack out there and also one of the oldest, having been available for about a decade now.

Quadral (16×16)

Another subtle texture change, Quadral does not change the resolution but instead focuses on the colours, adding a bright, vibrant overhaul that surprisingly makes the place feel like a whole new game altogether. For an HDR effect, this is the texture pack for you – and even comes with an add-on for the popular ‘Biomes O'Plenty’ Minecraft mod.

Anemoia (32×32)

If you ever wanted Minecraft to look like a surrealist painting, then this is the texture pack for you – this psychedelic overhaul will give an alien makeover to the animals and inhabitants, but also adds some bold and punchy colours. As an added bonus, there's twice as much detail as regular Minecraft too.

Annahstas Beastrinia (32×32)

Inspired by the growing Minecraft Pokemon homage known as Pixelmon, this texture pack enhances the colours and resolution to more closely match a Pokemon game. Animals are fittingly extra detailed, and there are even Pokéballs hidden in the bookcases.

Sapixcraft (512×512 – 16×16)

Acting like a high-resolution version of Quadral, Sapixcraft again eschews realism in favour of a cartoony look, with a focus on bright, eye-catching colours. There's also a choice of resolution from 16×16 all the way up to 512×512 – and even comes with a Christmas-themed add-on.

LB Photorealism Reload (128×128)

A popular HD texture pack resulting from years of work, LB Photo Realism Reload almost looks like a brand new next-generation game. Hardly changing the textures themselves but instead ramping up the resolution and quality, the game will soon be made up of the most lifelike blocks you've ever seen.

Jolicraft (16×16)

A fairytale, fantasy-esque texture pack, the fan-favourite Jolicraft will add some whimsical fun to your blocky world. With an interesting mix of some more vibrant colours and some more vibrant, it certainly feels like a medieval storybook – even the sun looks like a painting.

Jicklus (16×16)

Jicklus goes for the hometown farm look, covering everything with a warm coat of sepia in an effort to make it look more like a realistic countryside without messing with the resolution. Mountains, cliffs and other landforms look more organic – but it is the wonderfully detailed mob reskins that is the main reason to download.

Epic Adventures (32×32)

Again, Epic Adventures sticks to the default Minecraft style, but rather noticeably doubles the pixel count – with natural objects such as trees, clouds and the moon looking rather more detailed.

Rodrigo's Pack (8×8)

Yes, at 8×8 this texture pack will make Minecraft even lower resolution than before – but does have the effect of increasing the performance. The pack's use of clean, flat surfaces also increases draw distance drastically – ideal for multiplayer PvP games.

Bloom (16×16)

Again, this is a texture pack designed to turn up the contrast and add eye-catching colours, but this time is inspired by old-school Nintendo games. The add-on items are the best part of this pack, including the iconic Master Sword from Zelda.

RetroNES (16×16)

Speaking of Nintendo, this texture pack takes the nostalgia to the next level, by uncannily recreating the 8-bit graphics of Nintendo's first console with chunky blocks and black outlines. If you're happy to go back to Minecraft 1.8, there's even a sound pack to go with it.

MS Painted (128×128)

Taken from a rather bizarre inspiration, this surprisingly high-resolution texture pack was created using another low-spec program: Microsoft Paint. Delightfully silly, MS Painted revels in its unconventional charm.

Wind Waker Edition (16×16)

The Nintendo references continue in this tribute to the cel-shaded fan-favourite The Wind Waker. Bright and colourful just like the GameCube game, the villagers and mobs also have a Zelda-inspired design for a nice extra touch.

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How to Install Behavior Packs on Your Minecraft Server.

Behavior pack (Add-On) is a feature For Minecraft Bedrock Edition which allows you to customize the experience of your Minecraft server. This is the Bedrock Edition equivalent for data packs in Minecraft Java Edition which are used to add or override existing advancement, structures, recipes, and more.

How to Install a Behavior Pack in Your Minecraft Server.

Installing the Behaviour Pack on your PC.

Download the behavior pack you'd like to use - it should be a file with a .mcpack or .mcaddon extension.

How to Install Data Pack onto the Server.

The quickest and easiest way to get your pack working on the server is to create the world you intend to use on single-player first of all, and then

import it onto your server. Here's how you can do that:

Open up Minecraft: Bedrock Edition. Select Play , and create a New World.

How to Upload Your New World onto Your Server.

Log in to your server's Multicraft panel. If you have more than one server, select the server you would like to use a custom world with. Stop your server if it is currently running. This prevents the server from creating any new files or modifying existing ones.

Installing the Behavior Pack on your server.

Download the behavior pack you'd like to use. On your Multicraft control panel, navigate to Files > FTP File Access . In your root directory \ , open the behavior_packs folder.
