Samsung Galaxy S8 How to update Firmware manually.

On the Samsung Galaxy S8, new firmware updates are automatically offered for download and installation. However, it may well be that an update is displayed several days or weeks later.

Here, it makes sense to search for a new firmware for your Samsung Galaxy S8. This is easy by navigating to the following Android submenu on your smartphone:

Open the app menu and then use the gear icon to scroll down the list until you see "Software Update" - Select the entry.

Here you will find the menu point "Download updates manually", which you please tap on. Your Samsung Galaxy S8 will now look for a newer firmware and offer it if available for download and installation. Here it is sensible that you are in a W-Lan network, since the data amounts may be several hundred megabytes.

You now know how to manually search for a new Android firmware on the Samsung Galaxy S8, if it is not offered to you automatically.

How to update Android or its OS on Samsung Galaxy S8?

By owning a smartphone, you have an operating system, or OS, that you must regularly update.

The Android operating system, released in August 2016, is called Nougat or also called Android 7.0: each new operating system name of Android has a name of a candy.

Other OS like Ubuntu, Firefox or the Apple OS also have their names.

We will take Android as an example in these next paragraphs.

These systems include new features for Android devices, as it can be the case for your Samsung Galaxy S8. These updates are necessary for better performance of your Samsung Galaxy S8 when used, but not mandatory.

So we'll explain how to update Android on your Samsung Galaxy S8 First, we'll explain what the updates are for on a smartphone, how to update Android on your Samsung Galaxy S8, and why these updates might fail.

Explanation: Android updates on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

Updates on a smartphone are very common, they can be offered to you, several times a year.

Updating is updating the operating system on your Samsung Galaxy S8 if it has Android, in order to improve its performance, get new features, fix bugs, repair security breaches, etc. The reasons may be very numerous.

Therefore, by performing an update, this allows you to exploit all the capabilities of your smartphone.

These updates are not mandatory but are strongly recommended.

As soon as an update is available, you are notified by a notification.

Do not worry, if you upgrade, you will keep all your information on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

How to update Android on your Samsung Galaxy S8?

Prerequisites for the Android update on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

Before you start upgrading your Samsung Galaxy S8, there are a few rules that must be complied with to ensure that this update runs smoothly.

First, be connected to a correct Wi-Fi network and not to your cellular data since the upgrade may take some time and you may see your cellular data's consumption grow. Then your Samsung Galaxy S8 must be loaded at more than 50% or you can also recharge it during this manipulation.

Finally, your Samsung Galaxy S8 can not be used during the update of the software so leave it next to you. Once you have gathered all of these items, you can now start the Android Update on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

Android update on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

To begin this operation, go to the settings of your Samsung Galaxy S8 and go to the "About the phone" section.

When you click on it, you will need to press "Software Update" and then "Update" so that your Samsung Galaxy S8 checks to see if an update is available or not.

Finally, when your device detects the update, you just have to press "Restart and Install" to start the update.

The update may take a while or be fast, depending on its size.

In general, it does not last more than 10 minutes.

Wait until your Samsung Galaxy S8 restarts, then, after the update is complete, you will only have to follow the instructions if changes are requested.

The failures of an Android update on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

It is possible that after carefully following all the instructions we have given you in order to update your Samsung Galaxy S8, it does not work. First, it may be that your memory is full, so it is impossible for you to do the update.

Simply free up space by removing some applications or photos you have already transferred to your PC. Then, the update may not work for an unknown reason.

Make sure your Wi-Fi is connected to your Samsung Galaxy S8, if it does not work, try re-powering it, and if the problem persists, try installing the update a few days later.

If you encounter any of the listed problems or another problem, go to your phone company or an authorized repairer so that they can help you solve this problem. We hope that our article has helped you make updates on your Samsung Galaxy S8.

Samsung Galaxy S8 and Galaxy S8 Plus come with quite a few pre-installed apps. Users also have this tendency to test and play around with many other third-party apps, which means that soon after you started using this smartphone, you will be running a lot of apps on it. All these apps, from the Play Store or not, will eventually require updates and if you don't pay attention to the settings you have in place, you might notice them going behind your back and updating automatically.

If you want to have a better control of what happens on your device, you might need to disable Galaxy S8 automatic app updates, to begin with. Before we get to the nitty-gritty of how to do just that, let us specify a couple of other things.

By default, your smartphone will handle updates automatically. You might also have the option to let it notify you about updates and wait for your approval to install them. Or you could simply turn off automatic updates and handle the updates manually, all by yourself, whenever you see fit.

You don't like to completely lack the control of what apps will update and when? Do you hate the idea of having to deal with tons of update notifications and manually approving them just to declutter the notifications bar? At the same time, you really need to save your internet data and make sure that updates will only take place through a Wi-Fi connection?

Surprisingly or not, the answer to all your questions lies in the Google Play Store. If you learn how to handle this app, you will even be able to get rid of those annoying icons that automatically show up right on your Home screen, every time when you install a new app from the Store.

First-time Android users or not, the information presented below will serve you well. Here's how to get total control over new and old apps from your Samsung Galaxy S8 or Galaxy S8 Plus.

The quick change in Google Play Store.

If you fear that handling the updates is complicated, you'd be happy to hear that you will simply have to tackle the Google Play Store. Launch it from the Home screen or the App tray of your smartphone and open its menu by tapping the 3-lines symbol from the upper left corner of the screen.

Scroll down until you find the Settings tab and tap on it. You're now facing all the options that we have previously discussed. Under this section that contains the general settings of the Play Store, you can make all the necessary calls to determine how is your smartphone going to act from now on.

Enter the Auto-update Apps section, which, as you will easily notice, is set to automatically update all apps through a Wi-Fi connection, by default. While it is probably best to leave this setting as it is – a 2-4GB data plan could easily be consumed if you are to update your apps with the mobile data – focus on the Do Not Auto-Update Apps. Only when you select this feature you can be sure that the smartphone won't go on deciding on its own what and when to update, without bothering to ask your permission for it.

Since you're here and you have solved the automatic app updates problem, you can also uncheck the feature that creates Home screen icons automatically, with every new app that you install.

Just to recap, under the general settings of Google Play Store, you can decide:

If you want automatic updates / if you want to be notified about every single available update; If you want app updates over Wi-Fi / if you want app updates over mobile data as well.

Needless to say, when you're not really sure about the importance of certain updates, choosing to manually approve updates can be harmful to your smartphone, in case you miss an important update for an important system app. But if you're confident in your knowledge, you can go ahead and disable the automatic updates. Just make sure you check the Wi-Fi only updates so that your mobile data will be safe no matter what.

Your Galaxy S8 smartphone comes with a ton of features and functionalities, plus the availability to download and run loads of different third-party apps. Whether you stick to the apps available by default or you are planning to make some additions, you will be constantly facing the updates issues. Samsung Galaxy S8 devices are configured, by default, to automatically perform any necessary update. Even your stock apps will constantly update through the Google Play Store, not to mention anything else that you add on the go. Some users appreciate not having to deal with update permissions and making sure that all software is running on the latest versions. Others, however, would like to be more in control and at least get notifications about the updates in progress. If you're from the second category, you probably want to know how to disable the Galaxy S8 automatic updates for all its apps. Just bear in mind that if you set your device to ask your permission for every update, you might find yourself overwhelmed by such notifications soon enough. Either way, this article is a guide on where to go and what to do if you want to control any of these features. As you will soon discover, it is not nearly as intimidating or complicated as you might expect it to be. So, whether you have recently switched from an iPhone or it is simply your first time with an Android device, here is how to tackle the sensitive topic of automatic app updates.

How to control Galaxy S8 updates Considering that you take all your apps from the Play Store, it only makes sense that you can handle the updates from the same place. It is a matter of settings, which is why you will need to:

Go to the Home screen of your Galaxy S8 smartphone; Launch the Google Play Store app, either from the Home screen or from the Apps tray; Access its menu by tapping on the 3-lines icon next to the search bar; From the extended menu, tap on Settings; Look for the Auto-update apps menu, where you should see the default option of automatically updating apps via Wi-Fi; Consider all the options listed in there and choose according to your preferences.

If you ask us, this default option is one of the best you could get. The device takes care of all the necessary updates by its own and it makes sure that your mobile data won't be affected in any way throughout this process. A 4GB data plan could be easily consumed if your Galaxy S8 or Galaxy S8 Plus would accidentally start installing big apps, games or updates while you're using the mobile data. So, it's a great thing that it can't happen with this default setting. But, if we recall well, you wanted to know how to turn off the automatic updates of all the apps running on your Galaxy S8 smartphone. The answer to your question is one option available under the same menu and labeled as "Do not auto-update apps". If you select the latter, you block the automatic updates part, but not the automatic updates notification part... This means that, just like we initially suggested it could happen, your smartphone will send you repeated notifications asking you to confirm the various necessary updates. Definitely not the best option you could hope for, but it will make you feel more in control and it will also give you the opportunity to skip some updates on some applications. Nevertheless, our goal here was to show you the simple settings that empower you to control the app updates on Galaxy S8 and that's what we did. Which one it will be in the end is only your call.
