The best free torrent clients of 2021: faster, safer downloads.

Torrenting is ideal for downloading exceptionally large files – such as a video or a large piece of software – quickly and managing them efficiently.

With such large files, downloading directly from a host server will likely lead to a slow experience, particularly if other people are trying to grab the same file. But with a free torrent client, you can download pieces of the files you want from different people who already have them, leading to faster download times. It will do all the hard work for you as well, piecing together those files like a jigsaw.

Every torrent client has its own features and quirks, however, with varying features to help manage these large files. With this in mind, we've collated all the biggest names and put them to the test.

From our list, you can select the best free torrent client for your needs while avoiding the ones that are simply no good. Whether you need something that just gets the job done, or something more advanced that can be extended through the use of add-ons, you'll definitely find something here.

Are torrents legal?

Torrents have a bad reputation due to piracy, but they aren't illegal in themselves and have lots of legitimate uses, including downloading open source software and material that's in the public domain.

It all depends on the content you're downloading. Provided the copyright holder has given permission for the file to be shared this way it's fine, but using torrents to download content you'd otherwise have to pay for is not legal.

The best free torrent clients at a glance.

We strongly advise you get a great VPN for torrenting. The only way to keep yourself safe and anonymous when torrenting is to use a VPN. A VPN encrypts all your internet activity and passes it through a secure tunnel so that no one can see what you're reading or downloading - not even your ISP or the VPN service itself. One click and you're protected. This also allows you to unblock sites like The Pirate Bay, or access foreign versions of Netflix. The best VPN service according to our tests is ExpressVPN which effectively costs just \$6.67 per month and has a risk-free 30-day money back guarantee. [View Deal](#).

Download Music and TV Shows in Sequential Order with uTorrent.

BitTorrent is great for downloading multiple files in a group, but you can actually download them in order with uTorrent—so you can start listening to that first track right away, before the whole torrent has downloaded.

Not all torrent clients have this feature, but uTorrent (our favorite for Windows) has it easily accessible from the Files tab on any torrent: Just right-click on a file and choose "Prioritize by File Order." Provided the files are named sequentially, uTorrent will prioritize the files in order, meaning you can start listening to the first track or watching the first episode before the rest of the torrent has downloaded. Sadly, this feature is only available in the Windows client, not the Mac version.

Of course, uTorrent also has a streaming feature built-in that does something similar, but this is pretty cool too.

World's Oldest Torrent Still Alive After 15 Years.

The world's oldest active torrent file turned fifteen-years-old this week, a remarkable achievement. TorrentFreak catches up with the creator of "The Fanimatrix" torrent file, who saw BitTorrent as the only affordable option to share the Matrix fan film with the world.

In 2003 the 'world wide web' was an entirely different place than it is today.

This was especially true for streaming video. YouTube had yet to be invented, while Netflix only sent out films via the postal service.

It was at this time that a group of New Zealand friends was shooting a fan film of The Matrix, appropriately titled "The Fanimatrix." With a limited budget of just \$800, of which nearly half went into a leather jacket, they managed to complete the project in nine days.

There was a problem though. As video streaming services were still non-existent, distribution was a challenge. The makers managed to reduce the filesize down to 150MB, but even that was too expensive.

TorrentFreak spoke to the film's 'IT-guy' Sebastian Kai Frost, who also had a bit part in front of the camera, in addition to being a wire-work counterweight, gopher, and light holder. According to Frost, regular centralized hosting was not an option.

"In New Zealand this would have resulted in a completely unaffordable amount of bandwidth to be used sharing the file via traditional HTTP or FTP methods. Especially given that the entire bandwidth in and out of the country at the time was less than a modern WiFi link," Frost tells TorrentFreak.

With no budget left they had to find something cheap, or free. Frost, who was working as a network administrator at the time, went looking for a solution and stumbled upon a new technology that could help. Something called "BitTorrent."

"It looked promising because it scaled such that the more popular the file became, the more the bandwidth load was shared. It seemed like the perfect solution," Frost says, looking back.

After convincing the crew that BitTorrent was the right choice, Frost created a torrent on September 28, 2003. He also compiled a tracker on his own Linux box and made sure everything was running correctly.

That was fifteen years ago. Today, this torrent is still up and running with a handful of seeders. As far as we know, it's the oldest active torrent on the Internet. A real piece of history.

In a way, Fanimatrix became one of the first showcases of what BitTorrent can do.

Sure, at the time people were already sharing movies and TV-shows on sites such as Suprnova.org, Donkax.com, Bytemonsoon.com, and Torrentse.cx, but that was mostly pirated stuff. For the Fanimatrix, BitTorrent was a necessity.

"It turns out that using BitTorrent was a really really good idea because the file was downloaded over tens of thousands of times in the first week and then REALLY took off based off feature news articles on both New Zealand and American TV news," Frost recalls.

In a New Zealand Herald report from 2003, the film's director Rajneel Singh noted that the torrent had been downloaded 70,000 times in just one week. An impressive statistic, even by today's standards.

BitTorrent was not only able to handle all the downloads, but it was also a serious cost saver. The film crew did some back-of-the-napkin calculations at the time which showed that BitTorrent saved them roughly \$550,000 in bandwidth bills during the first month alone.

Frost and the team were blown away by the experience. And while the film is dated by today's special effect standards, it's good to see that people are still interested. Whatever their reason may be.

"The fact that people still seed it after all these years is a good feeling. Though I suspect a lot of people are on board now because they want to be part of keeping the world's oldest active torrent going. Which is in itself pretty cool," Frost says.

Frost plans to keep a restored version of the original site and the torrent up and running during the decade to come. It's a piece of Internet history, after all.

"At the time we had no idea how popular this 'BitTorrent' thing would become, but being there at the beginning, and having it still operating and seeding even now is a pretty awesome thing.

"I intend to keep it going as long as I have a seed left to give," Frost concludes.

Features.

Where It Excels.

Deluge aims to be a simple, cross-platform, feature-rich client, and it does it well. The plugin architecture is especially nice, so you can add on just the features you want instead of downloading a "bloated", feature-filled app. Its GUI is pretty easy to use, especially those coming from something like uTorrent on Windows , and its advanced features like remote access and bandwidth scheduling are must-haves for any BitTorrent user.

Where It Falls Short.

Deluge is written in Python, which allows it to be cross-platform, but not quite as lightweight as some other clients. As such, if you're using a particularly old computer, you might not like Deluge since you'll be delegating a lot of RAM to the simple task of downloading files. In addition, its plugin system can sometimes feel like a crapshoot—while it's definitely an advantage of the program, you can run into outdated plugins every once in a while, which is very disappointing when you want a certain feature.

The Competition.

If you don't like Deluge, try qBitTorrent. The two are very similar, though differ in a few minor features—for example, Deluge can run as a Daemon and has a nice plugin library, while qBitTorrent has a few more built-in features and is more lightweight. Essentially, qBitTorrent is probably the most feature-filled client out there, while Deluge is the client you can heavily customize, turning into the "perfect client for you". They're both fantastic programs; in fact, they're probably on par with one another—if we could say they're both the "best", we would. If you're using KDE and would like a well-integrated torrent client in the style of Deluge and qBitTorrent, KTorrent is a great option.

Transmission is great if you want something super lightweight and simple, but it lacks a lot of the features that more advanced programs offer (even compared to its still-feature-light Mac version). If all you want is to grab that Linux live CD, Transmission is fine, but if you're a heavier torrenter, you'll probably want to stick with something like Deluge or qBitTorrent.

Vuze is a popular client for very advanced users, offering more features than most other clients out there. The problem is, the app is very slow, bloated and to be honest, you probably don't need a lot of the features it offers unless you're a pretty advanced user. Though it does have some pretty cool streaming features if you want to watch your videos on your TV.

Lastly, rTorrent is a popular client that differs a lot from the other option in the sense that it has no GUI. Instead, you run it in a terminal, and you can remotely monitor it via SSH for an insanely lightweight BitTorrent experience. It's definitely not your traditional client, but Terminal nuts out there will probably love it for its simplicity.

Forza Motorsport 6: Apex.

I bet there are a few of you wondering just what the heck Forza Motorsport 6: Apex is. Well, this is the free-to-play version of the game that was one of the first big releases from Microsoft as they tried to show that Windows 10 could be great for gaming and let you play all of your favorite Xbox games. Does this free-to-play version come close to matching its big brother? No, of course, no! Yet, there is still some fun to be had here and you can even have fun without getting dragged into the microtransactions!

A Handful Of Challenge.

The full game has a very robust career mode and in Forza Motorsport 6: Apex, you get to experience a little bit of it. There are around 12 races and each one is introduced by some kind of motor racing TV presenter which is pretty cool. The mode is fine, but you are probably going to be able to blow through it in a few hours or so, still while it lasts it is pretty fun.

As well as this, you also have the Spotlight Mode. This was pretty cool as every couple of weeks new challenges would be added which would let you try out some pretty cool new cars.

A Taste Of The Action.

Forza Motorsport 6: Apex is a sim-style racing game; it is Horizon you want if you want the more arcade-style of Forza racing. I think the driving here is great, just as good as it is on the Xbox One and I never had any issues at all. I like how the driving is skill-based and they do a good job in giving you just a little bit of a taste of what the full experience offers.

There are hundreds of cars in the full game, but here we have just over 60. 60 cars is still a lot and the way you unlock them is fine. You can "pay" to unlock them faster, but I felt the natural progression of unlocking stuff just by racing was fine. If anything, it will be getting bored of racing on the same handful of tracks over and over again that gets to you.

Looking Over The Horizon.

One of the main things that this franchise is well known for is the visuals and Forza Motorsport 6: Apex does not disappoint in that regard. Now, you will need a fairly powerful PC to get the best out of this, but if you do you will be impressed with the visuals. I did notice a few frame stutters here and there, but that was probably down to my PC.

As good as the game looks, I have always felt that the Motorsport series has always been eclipsed by the Horizon series when it comes to the environments and that is true for this game as well.

It may just be a little bit of the full experience, but there is still a lot of hours of gameplay to enjoy here. I would look at this as more of an extended

demo than a free-to-play game. While it does have microtransactions, you can unlock the cars, tracks, and so on in Forza Motorsport 6: Apex if you just have a bit of patience. At the end of the day though, there is no way that I would pick this over the full Forza Motorsport 6 experience. The lack of a multiplayer mode (there are leaderboards) massively hurts the overall replay value.
